HANDIAMO

The handshake is a ritual which, throughout the centuries, has built its own codes and set of rules. Rather than a banal habit it is a multifaced performative act which, according to its enactment in different context, can assume a broad variaty of meanings.

In political communication the handshake represents and essential part of the protocol. It transfers itself fluidly from one meeting to another, drawing a wider connection which holds together all world leaders far in both space and political attitude. Intentionally or unintentionally, the way politicians perform the handshake tend to convey specific messages to the public.


The gestures displayed in the fluid choreography of the handshake can be pinned down as discrete movements. Through comparisons, and the recognition of recurring patters, the aim of this research is to investigate the non-verbal rethorics of the handshake, and to unravel different typologies of greetings.


The most neutral form of handshake consists in raising the right hand in front of the bust with the palm perpendicular to the ground.


Thumb pointing upwards

Falm perpendicular to the ground












The person on the left shows the back of the hand closer to the observer, visually over powering the other person's hand.







When the hands meet the fingers close into a grip. Then it usually follows a brief up and down movement.





Left hand touching the other person's shoulder





The left hand placed on the upper arm can be considerate a friendly gesture but also an attempt to exert authority.

Frequenly that the upper arm grasp is employed by the person entering the handshake from the right, so they bypass the camera disadvantage.





Left hand patting




The left hand facing downwards might be used sometimes to pat the other person's back of the hand too

The left hand is often used to double clasp the other person's hand. The double grasp traps the handshake and it limits the movement.

The double grasp double can be seen as a expression of esteem and affection but also to overpower the interlocutor and re-assert control.




The Trump's manoeuvre:

He offers his hand with the palm facing upwards.






He firmly grips and squeezes the other person's hand.




He pats the back of the hand and he pulls it towards himself.

Commonly refered as the 'homie handshake', it consists in rotating the palms so the fingers are clapping each other's thumbs.


The 'homie handshake' is an informal greeting and it is generally considered a sign of companionship.
